Luxonus

Admission to THEMUSEUM

All of life balances on a delicate string. While the universe expands and then contracts on a continuum, time is a construct based on our observations as temporary, living beings. On a universal scale, we rarely become aware of the ways in which light dictates our experience of time. Light traveling from a distant star allows us to gaze into the past. The prospect of traveling at the speed of light gives us a hint of what may be possible in the distant future. Linear time takes the shape of a wave when we begin to understand the elegant particle at the center of our experience.

Luxonus is a multimedia installation using luminescence and tempo to draw attention to this fundamental universal relationship. Thin, oscillating bands of light, reacting in perfect synchrony with evocative sounds, are revealed as they move along an intricate string sculpture. Elastic twine suspended within a black cube captures and reveals passing light, appearing as a wondrous web for audiences to explore. The resulting patterns offer a representation of time as non-linear and governed by our perception. Through this reflection, the audience may arrive at a deeper connection to their role in crafting time.

Originally conceived at Berklee College of Music Valencia, two iterations of Luxonus have already been shown as part of INOCON at Centro del Carmen de Cultura Contemporánea in Valencia, Spain, and at LUMEN Festival in Waterloo, Canada. Luxonus is site-specific, redesigned specifically to best fit the site of each installation



Hear Here Workshop with Yvonne Ng (tiger princess dance projects)

MINING THE SOURCE: Develop your movement vocabulary and find the dance in the memories and stories inside ourselves. Led by Yvonne Ng, participants will be guided in an improvisational setting using imagery as a tool to weave together various ways to warm the body and the imagination into a ready state of physicality. This will allow the participants to uncover and originate movement focusing and building on their impulses and personal histories found in their physical self. Using the choreographic vocabulary that each participant has generated. Yvonne will guide the participants with strategies to develop their choreographic voice, and with a practiced eye will gently mitigate the natural tendencies to fall back on learned or derivative choreography. This work celebrates diversity, collaboration, and individual creative empowerment: free of inhibition, accessing intuitive knowing, and inviting the mind to collaborate. A remarkably effective and revolutionary way of learning, the Open Source Forms approach can catalyze learning and transformation in many kinds of practices, in movement as well as voice, acting, and other fields of learning and creation. Hear Here Workshops are 60 min in length and are for all ages and stages of development.

longing for _, the debut album of Toronto-based percussionist Yang Chen manages to do the unthinakable: showcase their audacious eclecticism, sharp curatorial sensibility, and exceptional skill all at the same time. As such, Chen is right at home on the celebrated cross-border imprint People Places Records, a label known for embracing young, vibrant artists operating loosely within the bounds of contemporary composition.

longing for _ includes collaborations with one of People Places' head honchos, guitarist-composer Andrew Noseworthy alongside other respected (and largely emerging) talent such as Yaz Lancaster, Connie Li, Jason Doell, Sara Constant, Sarian Sankoh, Stephanie Orlando and Charles Lutvak. On it, Chen performs on everything from bicycle to steel pan evoking styles that span elegiac R&B to full-on electroacoustic abstraction.

-ce qui nous traverse- is a Montreal ensemble seeking to capture the intensive vibrations that compose the surrounding ambiances. The group is performing Le sacre de Sainte-Barbe (Cuchabata Records, 2021), a concept album focused on their singular relation to a small town in Quebec that emerged from a process of research-creation with members of the local community. Le sacre de Sainte-Barbe is an experimental study on the affective tonalities that could be perceived in rural North America. -ce qui nous traverse- proposes a multidisciplinary performance mixing live sonic experimentations with the work of the video artists Guillaume Vallée and Larissa Corriveau.

Medusa

Medusa is a unique chamber-folk quartet that blends the Western string quartet (violin, viola and cello), with Polish knee fiddles, Greek lira, and Swedish Nyckelharpa. We intertwine the sounds of Middle Eastern, Scandinavian, Celtic, and Eastern European music to create something entirely new. The instruments we play on are incredibly rare around the world. There is no other string band in existence with this highly unusual combination of instruments or with such a wide range of repertoire. Made up of musicians both classically trained and immersed in traditional music from different cultures, Medusa brings you an experience like no other.

Medusa made its debut at the Small World Music Festival in 2020, and has since been enthralling and delighting audiences at the BLOK Eastern European Festival (Toronto), the 4elements Living Arts Festival (Manitoulin Island), the Hidden Kingdom Festival (livestream from Bhutan), and the TSO 100th Anniversary Open House at Roy Thomson Hall, among others. Peter Hatch presents Lecture on Nothing, by John Cage, with special guests Gregory Oh and Richard Burrows

One of the 20th century's most important composers, John Cage is renowned as the composer of the piece 4'33", which consisted only of silence. Cage was a constant explorer and invented such things as the prepared piano, multi-media 'happenings' and "chance" elements applied to his work. He was a frequent lecturer and published several books around his lectures. The 1949 'Lecture on Nothing' visits favorite topics of his: noise vs music, tonality vs atonality, the twelve tone technique of composing. Cage was one of the first artists to embrace the Zen Buddhism that was introduced into North America in the 1940s. The ideas of mindfulness, emptiness, and nothingness attracted him greatly and began to influence his work. The Lecture on Nothing "is a composed talk, for I am making it just as I make a piece of music." The lecture is meant to be read in a 'musical' manner -rhythmically, "but with the rubato which one uses in everyday speech."

During the 1940s Cage was preoccupied with musical form or structure. Cage refers to the rhythmic structure in this piece as 'micro-macrocosmic'. Its five large parts are divided into 48 units, using the proportions 7 6 14 14 7. Each of these units is divided into 48 'small' parts using the same proportions. My interpretation makes use of visual dials to highlight the structural layers as they unfold and to draw attention to our experience of the passing of time while this happens. In the spirit of Cage, this performance includes extra sonic material, drawing from sounds and music mentioned in the text. This performance includes simultaneous performances of other works, a practice Cage developed in his own work starting shortly after writing his lecture. The appearance and disappearance of visual and sonic elements were determined by chance techniques, a practice Cage used in almost all of his mature work.

Counterstasis Trio with special guest Kathryn Ladano

Counterstasis is a collaborative improvisation trio formed in 2016, featuring Glen Hall (woodwinds, electroacoustics), Bill Gilliam (piano, prepared piano) and Joe Sorbara (drums, percussion). We work to counter stasis, to foster change, to create a music in which our individual voices can be refracted through the sounds of our co-conspirators.

Our spontaneously composed explorations of gestures and sonorities are connected to new chamber music, free jazz, sound art, experimental, and other creative music traditions. Counterstasis draws on a wide variety of traditional and extended techniques and employs both conventional and bent approaches to melodicism, groove, and chromatic harmony.

In 2019, we released our inaugural CD "Counterstasis - Refracted Voices", produced with the support of the City of Toronto through the Toronto Arts Council. Our music has been featured by All That Jazz, Electric Sense, One Man's Jazz radio and Dispersion Lab. As a trio and collaborating with other improvising musicians, we have performed at venues in Toronto and Montreal including shows with guest improvisors such as clarinetist Lori Freedman and vocalist Christine Duncan.

Dr. Kathryn Ladano has established herself as one of Canada's foremost bass clarinetists. As a specialist of contemporary music and free improvisation, Ladano is a dynamic soloist and in-demand collaborator. She is currently the Artistic Director of NUMUS concerts, the Director of ICE (Improvisation Concerts Ensemble) and instructor of improvisation at Wilfrid Laurier University. Kathryn has released two solo albums, "Open" (2010) and "Masked" (2019).

Daniel Ramjattan presents Inspirations: New Music for Solo Guitar

This concert will feature live performances from Daniel Ramjattan's debut solo album, Inspirations: New Music for Solo Guitar, which was conceived in 2019 and released in January 2022. All of these solo guitar compositions were composed by living composers based in Canada with a special connection to the soloist. Named after John Gordon Armstrong's title track, this project consists of substantial and virtuosic contributions to the solo guitar repertoire, and deals broadly with themes related to mental health, spirituality, transcendence, resilience, and our symbiotic relationship with technology. Each one of these compositions was written relatively recently, and three of the works were written expressly for this project.


